## **SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES**

Lieutenant General **Andrzej Fałkowski** has been Poland's Military Representative to the NATO and EU Military Committees since 2014. Previously, he served as Deputy Chief of General Staff of the Polish Armed Forces. From 2011 to 2013, General Fałkowski was Defense, Military, Naval and Air Attaché of Poland to the USA in Washington D.C. and from 2009 to 2011, he was Director of the Logistics and Resources Division in the International Military Staff, NATO HQ in Brussels. His past assignments include: Deputy Head of the Strategic Planning Directorate – J5 of the Polish Armed Forces General Staff (2003-2006), Counselor in the Delegation of the Republic of Poland to NATO and WEU in Brussels (1998–2003) and Deputy Director of the MOD Economic Department (1996-1998). The General earned his B.A. from the Military Academy of Logistics in Poznań (1982), his M.A. from the University of Gdańsk (1985), and Ph.D. from the University of Łódź (1997), all in economics. He also completed Postgraduate Studies in Military Economics at the Economics Faculty of the Military Academy of Politics (1988).

Lieutenant General Frederick "Ben" Hodges graduated from the United States Military Academy and was commissioned into the Infantry. He commanded Infantry units at the Company, Battalion and Brigade levels in the 101st Airborne Division. He led the "Bastogne" Brigade during Operation IRAQI FREEDOM. His most recent operational assignment was as Director of Operations, Regional Command South, in Kandahar, Afghanistan. He also served in a variety of Joint and Army Staff positions, including the following: Chief of Plans, 2nd Infantry Division in Korea; Aide-de-Camp to the Supreme Allied Commander Europe; and Director of the Joint Staff Pakistan Afghanistan Coordination Cell. LTG Hodges held the position of Chief of Legislative Liaison for the United States Army, from July 2011 to July 2012. Before taking up his current post as Commanding General, US Army Europe, he was Commander, NATO Allied Land Command from 2012 to 2014.

**Mike Lyden** is the General Manager of the NATO Support and Procurement Agency, a key element of NATO's focus on Smart Defense and Agency Reform. He retired as a Rear Admiral from the United States Navy in October 2011 after serving for over 32 years in the Navy Supply Corps, the U.S. Navy's cadre of business and logistics professionals. His Navy career culminated with his assignment as Commander, Naval Supply Systems Command and 45th Chief of the Navy Supply Corps from 2008 to July 2011.

Mike Lyden received a bachelor's degree in Management Engineering from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and was commissioned through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps in 1978. He also received a Master's in Business Administration from Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration, and is a graduate of the Advanced Management Program at the Kellogg School of Management, Northwestern University in the United States.

Mike Lyden's afloat tours include supply officer, USS Valdez (FF 1096); stock control officer, USNS Sirius (T-AFS 8); and supply officer, USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70).

His shore and staff assignments include Navy Supply Corps School, Naval Air Station Whidbey Island, Naval Aviation Supply Office, Naval Supply Systems Command, and Office of Chief of Naval Operations.

His joint and multinational experience includes Director, Logistics and Security Assistance (EUCOM J-4), United States European Command, Stuttgart, Germany; Commander, Defense Supply Center Richmond, Va.: and as Executive Officer to the Director, Defense Logistics Agency.
